# MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY 12, 2014 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

### CALL TO ORDER:

President Kosel called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and noted the Directors and staff that were present, and that Director de Ville was excused.

### APPROVAL OF CONSENT ITEMS:

President Kosel called for the approval of the consent calendar (items 3, 4, 5, 6 & 7) consisting of approval of the minutes of the January 8, 2014 meeting, approval of the monthly transmittal #8, approval of the monthly December/January financial report, approval of the December incident activity report, and approval of the January incident activity report. Director Blaschczyk made a motion to accept the consent calendar items as presented. Director Harmon seconded the motion.

## **ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:**

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Kosel thanked Manager Navellier for providing the Board members with a roster including pictures of all the firefighters.

Kosel noted the certificate and plaque displayed on the Board's table. Four Directors, Chief Maples and Navellier attended the CSDA chapter meeting last month to receive honors for the District Transparency Certificate and Reaccreditation as a District of Distinction.

Kosel sent an email last month to KPPCSD President Welsh asking for that district's lease proposal to KFPD. She sent a copy to each KFPD Board member and staff. Welsh and Kosel met to discuss the subject and Welsh said he would be responding to the email. No response has been received yet. KFPD district legal counsel has advised the proposal can be considered by the Board in closed session.

In reference to last month's adoption of the audit, Kosel noted that Director Nagel was correct in correcting the footnote numbers and updates pages 7 and 8 of the audit were included in the Board's packet. A net change in program expenses for FY12 and FY13 were also included in answer to Nagel's question about the \$95,000 difference in operating expenses between the two years. Kosel also stated that the District's budget for staff appreciation is \$2,500, not \$3,500 as stated by a member of the public. In fact \$1,487 was spent out of that budgeted amount.

### **CHIEF'S REPORT:**

Chief Maples said there has been enough rain to change the fuel moisture content in the vegetation but not enough to affect California's drought. Cal Fire plans on declaring fire season extremely early this year, possibly on April 15<sup>th</sup>.

The Board packet included an overview on the CERT program during 2013. El Cerrito-Kensington is still cooperating with neighboring agencies and sharing classes. Eighty-seven people participated in CERT in 2013. There is a class that begins at the end of February. The program now has Area Coordinators for 17 CERT areas in both communities.

An overview of 2013 training activities was also provided. Firefighters have completed their eighth year working with an on-line training company. This is much more efficient than a classroom setting for much training. Personnel have completed 6,000 courses/activities on-line during those eight years. The department completed 150 performance evolutions during the year. Battalion Chief Gibson is in charge of that training. Maples reviewed many of the training activities completed including those with neighboring agencies and with the three new hires. A new regional training facility is going to open up in 2014. The facility was built by Chevron and much of the computers/books, etc. are sponsored by the Maritime Academy. Chevron also sends ECFD personnel to live fire training at Texas A&M every year. All command staff have attended this training.

Rodeo-Hercules was successful with a Fire Act grant for staffing of nine firefighters. This will reopen their closed session and bring depth back to West County. Discussion followed on the difficulties faced by East Contra Costa County Fire Protection District. ECCCFPD is considering applying for a staffing grant and also passing a parcel tax.

Maples discussed the possibility of starting the vegetation management inspection early due to the drought. In the past, when the department attempted to start the program early, residents were not receptive because the weeds grow back in between the first and second inspections. The department will consider whether it is necessary as the season progresses.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Mid-Year Budget Review and Budget Revision: Kosel noted that there are two budgets in the packet - one dated 9/11/13 (which was accepted last fall) and a revision dated 2/12/14. The proposed change in the 2/12/14 budget is the State of California loan receivable which was in fact paid in the prior fiscal year and is no longer a receivable. Kosel reviewed the Planning Budget for FY14-15 which shows the District being \$150,000 in the negative for that year largely due to planned water system improvements. The Type I engine will also be replaced in FY14-15 per the replacement schedule at approximately \$630,000 which has been saved in a designated fund. Discussion followed on the State of California loan. Director Kosel made a motion to adopt the 2/12/14 budget as revised in the packet. When questioned, Chief Maples believes the \$630,000 Type I Engine estimate is adequate. Changes and modernization to the lockers/apparatus room may need to be made to accommodate the new engine which will be approximately 18" to 24" longer then the existing engine. Maples gave more details on the proposed new engine and the maintenance of the existing engine. Maples will attempt to get quotes for the locker revisions to include in the FY14-15 budget. In answer to a question from the public, Kosel explained that the District would set up a new designated fund for a Type I once the District knows exactly how much the purchase in FY14-15 will be with an adjustment for inflation. Kosel also explained the District has separate operating expense and capital budgets. A member of the public asked how the District prioritized the water system improvements. KFPD had a fire flow study completed by EBMUD and also wrote a master plan for the water system improvements. Hydrant spacing is based on an optimum of 500 feet apart. Director Blaschczyk seconded the motion.



## 2013 Fire Prevention Update

In 2013 the Fire Prevention Division continued to have a busy and very successful year. The major programs the Fire Prevention Division is involved in include: Mercantile Fire Safety Inspections, New Building Construction which includes plan reviews and field inspections, Public Education and the Weed Abatement Program. These four programs keep the Prevention Division extremely busy throughout the year and provide the greatest challenges and rewards.

Fire Safety Inspections

El Cerrito and Kensington have more than 500 businesses that are inspected annually by on-duty engine companies. There are typically six (6) types of inspections the engine companies conduct. They are: General Fire Safety, Educational Facilities, Fire Sprinkler, Fire Alarm, Hazardous Occupancy and Commercial Cooking Fire Suppression (Hood & Duct) Inspections. Many of the business that are inspected by engine companies receive multiple inspections concurrently (e.g., Fire Safety, Fire Sprinkler) and some require all six inspection types to be conducted. Of these 500 businesses, the Fire Department had a 95% completion rate. The businesses that do not comply are forwarded to the Fire Prevention Officer to ensure Fire Code compliance is met. The result of the comprehensive Fire Safety Inspection Program is one of the lowest fire losses in commercial occupancies in the state.

New Building Construction Inspections

New building construction includes plan review, onsite inspections and final inspections. In 2013, the Fire Department completed 43 plan reviews and more than 30 construction site inspections. This year the overall number of new construction inspections is down due to the industry-wide slowdown. Construction site inspections conducted by the Prevention Division mainly focus on Life Safety Systems. The majority of these site inspections include fire sprinkler, fire alarm system installation and acceptance, water supply and hydrant spacing, commercial cooking facility fire suppression systems, emergency exiting and lighting.

### **Public Education**

Public Education continues to evolve. The infant car seat installation program continues to be successful and continues to expand. This year there were more than 70 infant and child care seats installed for Kensington and El Cerrito residents. The Fire Department car seat installers have also worked with John Muir Hospital hosting a car seat installation workshop and have

participated in other car seat installation workshops throughout the region installing car seats with John Muir Hospital staff. In addition to installing the car seats, the fire department installers train the new parents in how to correctly and safely install or transfer their car seats between their vehicles.

The Fire Safety Trailer continues to be a great success in public education. This year the Fire Department has conducted fire safety education for more than 2,600 people of all ages. They have achieved this by being extremely active in seeking opportunities to educate the public in fire safety. The main avenues they reach the public is through fire station tours, going to public and private schools and other public events like the Tri-City Safety Day, Fourth of July Festival and Halloween. The Fire Safety Trailer has been used at several City sponsored events as well as business sponsored events and draws large numbers of participants.

In addition, the Department has conducted six CPR/First Aid classes for the public that has drawn 60 students. The citizens of El Cerrito are excited and eager to seize every opportunity to learn about emergency preparedness.

## Weed Abatement Program

The Fire Department's Weed Abatement Program remains the most challenging and time consuming program. The program consists of inspecting every property within El Cerrito and Kensington, identifying fire hazards and having those fire hazards removed or brought up to acceptable levels. After every property is inspected, a letter of non-compliance is sent to those properties and property owners that do not comply with the adopted "Vegetation Management Standards". This year the Fire Prevention Division sent out more than 175 notices of non-compliance and had all but seven of the properties brought into compliance voluntarily. This was achieved through the hard diligent work of Prevention Department personnel, making hundreds of phone calls and site visits to educate property owners of the risk and standards they were to maintain.

# **Smoke/CO Detectors Save Lives**

Most fatal home fires and carbon monoxide (CO) accidents occur at night, while people are asleep. Poisonous gases and smoke from a fire can numb the senses in a very short time, putting people into a deeper sleep. Every home needs devices that can wake people up in time to escape from fire or the build-up of carbon monoxide. Smoke and CO detectors really do save lives!

Smoke detectors are designed to alert you to the fact that there is a fire in the house. You should have a smoke detector in each bedroom and on each story of your house (including the basement or attic). CO alarms detect carbon monoxide, an invisible, odorless, colorless gas. Sources of CO include heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel, and vehicles or generators running in an attached garage. CO detectors should be installed outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. It's extremely important to test and clean all detectors and change the batteries regu-

larly. An easy way to remember to replace the batteries is to do so when you adjust your clocks for daylight saving time (spring and fall). The detectors themselves should be replaced approximately every ten years. Always be sure to follow the manufacturer's recommendations for installation, testing, maintenance and disposal of the detectors.



In an effort to insure that everyone has working smoke detectors in their homes, the Kensington Fire Protection District has a smoke detector program that supplies and installs smoke detectors for senior or disabled persons upon request. For more information, call 215-4450.

We will be accepting unwanted/expired medications through the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency's "Got Drugs?" national take-back initiative that is held twice a year..

Drop off is between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Kensington Fire Station, 217 Arlington Avenue, Kensington. No questions are asked.

We are now able to accept all medications including narcotics. Please be sure to put any used sharps

into a container and please no drop-offs other than during the designated time.

It is important not to flush your unwanted medications down the toilet, as they will pollute our drinking water and ground soil. Unwanted medications left in your medicine cabinet put children and teens at risk. Call 215-4450 with any questions regarding this event.

We do not accept any household hazardous waste.

**SEAT C** 

The Elections and Bylaws Committee is looking for Independent Special District Board Members or their General Managers who are interested in leading the direction of the California Special Districts Association for the 2015 - 2017 term.

The leadership of CSDA is elected from its six geographical regions. Each of the six regions has three seats on the Board with staggered 3-year terms. Candidates must be affiliated with an independent special district that is a CSDA regular member located within the geographic region that they seek to represent. (See attached Region Map)

The CSDA Board of Directors is the governing body responsible for all policy decisions related to CSDA's member services, legislative advocacy, education and resources. The Board of Directors is crucial to the operation of the Association and to the representation of the common interests of all California's special districts before the Legislature and the State Administration. Serving on the Board requires one's interest in the issues confronting special districts statewide.

# **Commitment and Expectations:**

- Attend all Board meetings, held every other month at the CSDA office in Sacramento.
- Participate on at least one committee, meets 3-5 times a year at the CSDA office in Sacramento.
  - CSDA reimburses Directors for their related expenses for Board and committee meetings as outlined in Board policy.
- Attend CSDA's two annual events: Special District Legislative Days (held in the spring) and the CSDA Annual Conference (held in the fall).
- Complete all four modules of CSDA's Special District Leadership Academy within 2 years.

(CSDA does not reimburse for expenses for the two conferences or the Academy classes even if a Board or committee meeting is held in conjunction with the events).

Nomination Procedures: Any Regular Member is eligible to nominate one person, a board member or managerial employee (as defined by that district's Board of Directors), for election to the CSDA Board of Directors. A copy of the member district's resolution or minute action and Candidate Information Sheet must accompany the nomination. The deadline for receiving nominations is May 23, 2014. Nominations and supporting documentation may be mailed or faxed.

Nominees will receive a Candidate's Packet in the mail. The packet will include campaign guidelines.

CSDA will mail ballots on June 6<sup>th</sup>. The ballots must be received by CSDA no later than 5:00 p.m. August 1, 2014 and <u>must be the original ballot</u> (no faxes or emails). The successful candidates will be notified no later than August 5<sup>th</sup>. All selected Board Members will be introduced at the Annual Conference in Palm Springs, CA in September.


